

What is Impact Aid?

The purpose of Impact Aid is to provide formula grants to school districts burdened by the presence of nontaxable federal land and installations to make up for the lost revenues and additional costs associated with the federal presence. It is one of the few formula programs where Local Educational Agencies receive funds directly from the U.S. Department of Education rather than through their states. Impact Aid was first signed into law by President Harry S. Truman in 1950 and has been amended many times since then. This program provides a payment in lieu of local taxes otherwise collected for Local Educational Agencies that are burdened by the presence of nontaxable federal land and installations, but are nonetheless responsible for educating children of federal personnel who live and/or work on these properties. Except for money earmarked specifically for children with disabilities, the aid becomes part of the Local Educational Agencies regular budget, and no specific restrictions are placed on the use of the funds.

The Lapwai School District is 100-percent LOT, which means we are in the highest needs category in terms of federal impaction. Impact Aid is approximately 31% of our operating budget. Over 14,000 students in 12 Idaho school districts rely on this irreplaceable support.



Staff Qualifications



Federal law requires each school receiving Title I funds to notify parents that information regarding the professional qualifications of their child's teacher may be requested.

As a parent of a student attending a school receiving federal funds, you have the right to know:

1. Is my child's teacher licensed to teach the grade(s) and subject(s) assigned?
2. Is my child's teacher teaching with a provisional license, meaning the state has waived the requirements?
3. What is the college major of my child's teacher?
4. What degree(s) does my child's teacher hold?






If you or your family are in a temporary or inadequate living situation due to a loss of housing, we can help!

If you are living in any of the following situations:

- Shared housing with other friends or families
- Runaway/homeless youth, and students who are not living with a parent or legally court-appointed guardian
- Temporary or transitional housing
- Emergency and domestic violence shelters
- Motels or hotels
- Campgrounds or inadequate trailer homes
- Substandard housing (homes without heat, water, or working appliances)
- Cars, abandoned buildings, parks, the streets or other public spaces

We may be able to help you or your child:

- Enroll in school
- Remain in your school if you move to another area
- With transportation to and from school
- Social referrals
- Other services

You or Your Children May Qualify for:

Free school meals

Transportation to school programs

Free school supplies

Free community resource referrals

The McKinney-Vento Education Assistance Act Provides Certain Protections If You or Your Family Live in Any of These Situations:

with relatives or friends because you lost your housing or can't afford housing on your own

in a car or couch surfing

in a shelter, motel, or campground

in an RV/trailer, substandard housing, or a building - without basic services (heat, water, sewer)



Eligible Students Have the Right to:

- Go to school, no matter where you live or how long you have lived there.
- Enroll in school without giving a permanent address – enrollment may not be delayed even if lacking the documents normally required for enrollment.
- Enroll and attend classes even if you don't have immunization records or a birth certificate while the school arranges for needed records.
- Continue to go to the school you were attending before becoming homeless, or the school last attended, if that is your preference and it is feasible.
- Receive transportation to school of origin, if preferred and it is in the best interest of the student.
- Participate in special programs and services for which any student qualifies, including athletics and other extra-curricular activities.
- File a dispute if you disagree with the enrollment, eligibility, or services for you/your child related to the McKinney-Vento Act.

Health Coverage Assistance

The Health Coverage Assistance Program provides health coverage assistance according to individuals needs. Eligible families may qualify for Medicaid or Advance Payment of Premium Tax Credits to help pay health coverage premiums or affordable private health insurance plans.



Food Assistance

The Idaho Food Stamp Program is a supplemental nutrition assistance program that helps families buy food for good health. Eligible families get a debit like card to buy food items.



Cash Assistance

This program provides cash assistance for: emergency situations, families with children, and the elderly, blind or disabled. Eligible families receive a one time or on-going payment, depending on the needs of the household.



Child Care Assistance

This program helps parents and caretakers pay for a part of their child care costs while working, going to school, or participating in approved training activities.
